# Hortor's Recipes

## Vegetable Biryani

- |                                 |                                              |
|---------------------------------|----------------------------------------------|
| 250g (8oz) basmati rice, rinsed | 300ml (1/2 pint) vegetable stock             |
| 6 tabs sunflower oil            | 4 ripe tomatoes, skinned, deseeded and diced |
| 2 large onions, thinly sliced   | 175g (6oz) cauliflower florets               |
| 2 garlic cloves, crushed        | 125g (4oz) frozen peas, thawed               |
| 2 tsp grated fresh root ginger  | 50g (2oz) cashew nuts, toasted               |
| 250g (8oz) sweet potato, diced  | 2 tabs chopped fresh coriander               |
| 2 large carrots, diced          | Salt and pepper                              |
| 1 tab curry paste               | 2 hard-boiled eggs, quartered, to serve      |
| 2 tsp ground turmeric           |                                              |
| 1 tsp ground cinnamon           |                                              |
| 1 tsp chilli powder             |                                              |

Bring a large saucepan of salted water to the boil, add the basmati rice and return to simmer. Cook gently for 5 minutes. Drain, refresh under cold water and drain again. Spread the rice out on a large baking sheet and set aside to dry.

Heat 2 tabs of oil in a frying pan, add half the onion and fry over a medium heat for 10 minutes until very crisp and golden. Remove and drain on paper towels. Reserve for garnishing.

Add the remaining oil to the pan and fry the remaining onion with the garlic and ginger for 5 minutes. Add the potato, carrots and spices and fry for a further 10 minutes until light golden.

Add the stock and tomatoes, bring to the boil, cover and simmer gently for 20 minutes. Add the cauliflower and peas and cook for a further 8-10 minutes until all the vegetables are tender.

Stir in the rice, cashew nuts and coriander. Cook, stirring, for 3 minutes, then cover and remove from the heat. Leave to stand for 5 minutes before serving with the egg quarters.

# DOG FOULING

*From the Parish Council*

## **Dog Fouling - Main Street**

Recently a number of complaints have been received by the Parish Council with regard to the problem of dog fouling, particularly along Main Street in the village. The Parish Council would like to remind people that dog fouling is an offence and would be grateful if owners or those people walking dogs could remove any dog mess left by dogs they are responsible for.

## **Health risks associated with dog fouling**

The incidence of dog fouling within the village has reached unacceptable proportions. Many of us have dogs and enjoy the company and pleasure they bring to our lives, however most of the areas that make Hickling so special are now becoming danger zones for our children. The towpath along the canal and the main roads and pavements within the village are blighted by this public menace.

As responsible dog owners please always pick up after your dogs, it only takes a couple of seconds to do this and means that you are not breaking the law by allowing your dog to foul in a public place.

A public place means land to which the public has access within built up areas in the Borough which includes roads with a speed limit of 40mph or less and amenity open spaces managed by Rushcliffe Borough Council. This includes the whole of the Grantham Canal towing path within the Borough of Rushcliffe.

The Council recently prosecuted a Rushcliffe resident who allowed his dog to foul in Alford Road Playing Fields, West Bridgford. When

asked to clean up the mess he refused. He also refused to give his name and address to allow a fixed penalty ticket to be issued. The Council took the offender to court instead and as a result, he was fined £250. An expensive mistake to make and one which he is unlikely to make again.

As well as being unpleasant and unsightly, the main purpose of the law requiring people to pick up dog's mess is to control the public health risk posed by the parasite toxocara which can cause blindness if swallowed. Although the parasite can be found in cats, its main host is the dog, and its eggs, which can remain viable for up to 2 years are found in dog's faeces. If the faeces are left in parks, paths, verges, sandpits or play areas, they can be picked up on shoes, children's hands, the wheels of pushchairs, wheelchairs etc. It may take weeks or months after swallowing these eggs for symptoms to develop which can last for a year or more and include one or more of the following: headache, fever, sore throat, aching limbs, abdominal pain, sleep disturbance, listlessness, pneumonia, asthma. Eye symptoms are not always present although blindness resulting from toxocariasis affects around 100 people a year and may develop 4-10 years after the initial infection. The main group of people at risk are children who play where irresponsible dog owners have allowed their dogs to foul without clearing it up afterwards. Fortunately the disease can be controlled if the faeces are disposed of immediately in a responsible manner.

As other animals are not a host for toxocara and are also as likely to be fouling areas where the public walk or play, the legislation does not extend to clearing up after other animals.

You cannot catch toxocariasis from an infected human being, only from the faeces of an infected animal - usually a dog.

Always wash you hands after handling animals or soil and before touching food.

**So please let's make Hickling a cleaner and safer environment for everyone.**

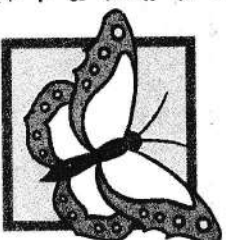

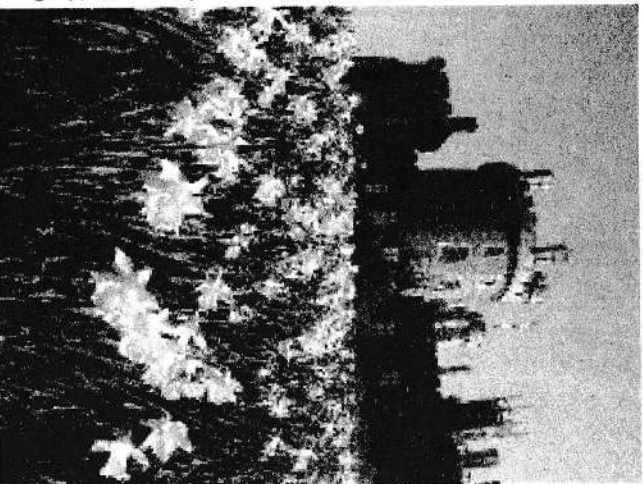

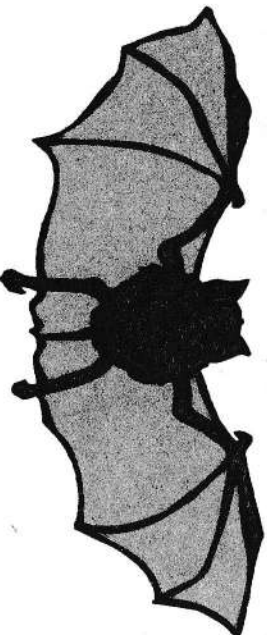

## Hickling Village Hall Events

Since the last issue of The Hickling Standard there have been three "audience" events at the Hall.

First there was the pantomime, about which I expect there will be a separate article (and maybe photographs) so I will not steal their thunder. Suffice to say it was a very enjoyable production and well supported. As usual tickets were at a premium and sold fast. We have wealth of "acting" talent in this Parish (and a number were not acting!) plus there was Tony Walker. What will he appear as next time?

The beginning of March saw a visit by Duncan Walsh Atkins and Tim FitzHigham from the London area who were (and still are) touring the country with their show "At the Drop of a Hippopotamus". This was an evening of Flanders and Swann, that famous duo of piano and song, with titles about this, that and a variety of animals, including the hippo. Our duo that evening certainly gave us a memorable show and were very true to the original pair who were at their height in the 1950s and 60s.

Two weeks later saw a very different act, a trio of "lads" from Newcastle upon Tyne calling themselves "The Old Rope String Band". Their entertainment was a variety of music and comedy, using a variety of instruments and objects to give us an evening of unforgettable slapstick humour. Their audience was to be heard some distance away with their laughing and cheering. Anyone on the front row certainly wondered whether they had chosen their seats wisely once the show started. Dorothy Chahal for one was included in their humour and was showered in dried peas but she feared it might have been something far worse. 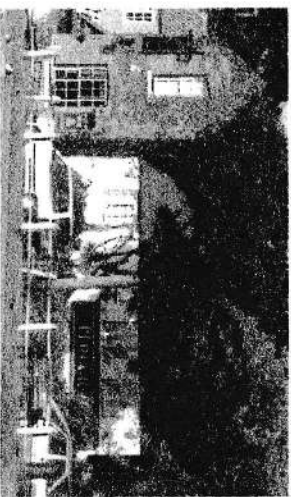

## HICKLING GETS ITS VERY OWN PLAQUE

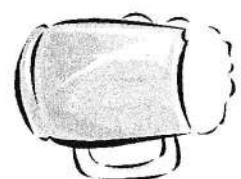

## Making the X count.

'You get the leaders you deserve.' The quote attributed to John Adams has been used not only to dismiss the dissatisfied but also to encourage participation in the democratic process. It is being widely assumed that there will be a general election on 5<sup>th</sup> May; certainly the political arguments (slanging matches?) are being well rehearsed already.

One Westminster watcher has pointed out that 'the vast majority of winning candidates will wing their way to Westminster with the support of less than half of those who vote.' Or, put it another way, fewer than one quarter of the population will elect our next government! To me that is incredible! Some will say that is because of our 'first past the post' system. But another reason for this is voter apathy. Have we become such a relaxed democracy that we cannot be bothered to make the effort to have our say at the right time? Or is it that we think we cannot make a difference, that our vote will be wasted because we support one of the less favoured parties in our particular area?

People power is on the up in our world. We have seen the 'orange revolution' in the Ukraine where the huge numbers of protestors brought about a rerun of the election. As I write we are seeing something similar in Lebanon. In countries where the freedom to vote has been denied for years people rejoice to exercise their vote. We might get very bored by the prolonged electioneering but do we have a right to complain afterwards if we take no part in the vote? The opposite of apathy is participation; that requires a minimum of reading the literature that will come through our letter boxes from the different parties, making up our minds and then going to vote. Our individual cross on the ballot paper is the enemy of apathy.

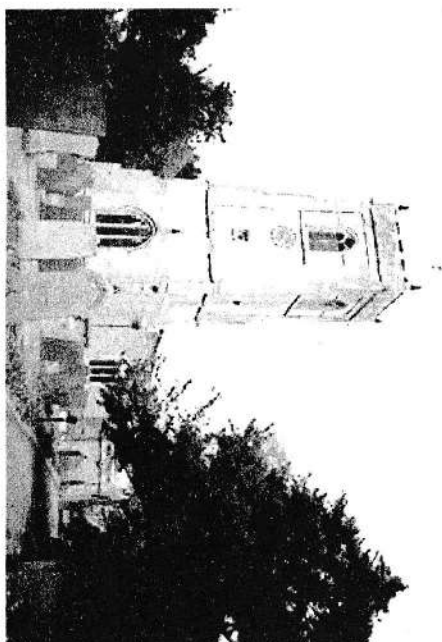
As we approach Easter I am reminded that the cross, God's mark, was the ultimate participation in world affairs. Certainly there was politics involved in that event and the exercise of power by the few. But the triumph of God broke all bounds on Easter Sunday with the Resurrection. In the power of the resurrection Christians are not only called to pray for those who govern, or seek to, but also we are called to participate fully and hold the powerful to account in matters of justice and mercy. The Cross is the enemy of apathy.

# Tulips

The first age of tulipomania in 1630s Holland famously ended with a crash, when bulb investors traded their speculative value up and up until the market collapsed.

In the seventeenth century, if you grew a certain variety of tulip it was like driving a Porsche! The most coveted of all, like the red and white *Tulipa Semper Augustus*, were out of the league of even the wealthy, who instead might commission the pin-sharp still life paintings that were the next best thing. No-one at the time knew how or why a single coloured bulb could 'break' and create beautifully flamed flowers: scientists only cracked the mystery in the 1920s. The tulips' dramatic inky streaks and unpredictable colour changes were caused by a virus - carried, prosaically enough, by aphids.

Over 2000 tulips will form the basis of the National Trust's Dyham Park's Tulipomania festival from April 15th-19th. Ironically, fortunes have reversed so that original seventeenth century pagoda style pyramid vases are now too rare and fragile to be used to display fresh tulips. Examples include one by William Blythwayt designed to hold 28 single tulips in seven tiers.

The Dutch still-life paintings of fruit and flowers in many a country house are intended as a warning against earthly pleasures. Dew-dropped flowers, with their brief lives, allude to the transience of human life, too: similarly, look out for caterpillars and butterflies or broken birds' eggs, symbolising death and resurrection. Before the cataclysmic market crash in 1637, the tulip represented wealth and power: after that, it also became known as a symbol of man's greed.

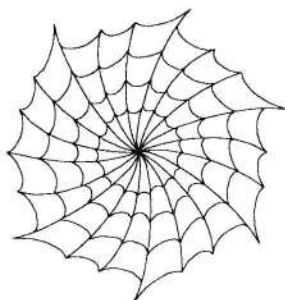

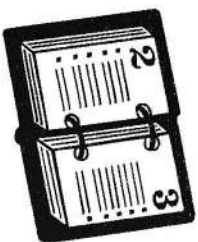
