
Namaste



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

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

### **Bus service**

There have been complaints about the quality of the bus service in Hickling. This resulted in the Parish Council writing to the County Council, which gives financial support to maintain these routes. In view of the serious inconvenience that an unreliable service can cause, their response is printed in full.

"Thank you for forwarding the recent problems with service 29 operated by Veolia Transport. We were made aware of these issues at the time and have issued a number of penalties against the company. We have requested that all drivers are reminded of their duties and adequately route learned.

"The current contract for service 29 now ends in August when the service will be replaced by a new network of routes. The changes involve the current service 12, 29 and 63, all of which operate through this area. The tenders have been returned today, hopefully we will be sending a report to Cabinet shortly recommending the award of the new contracts.

"The new services will all be operated by low floor accessible vehicles and will provide improved links from the villages to Nottingham, Q.M.C as well as Keyworth and Cotgrave. Timetables and information will hopefully be available in a few weeks time.

"The performance in recent months has been below the standard we would expect, the new services will be monitored by our Inspectors to ensure reliability and restore the confidence of the bus users. We do have a number of regular contacts in the villages, their feedback is always welcome and does assist in targeting areas of poor performance."


### Race For Life 2009 Castle Donington - July 7th

### And from a newspaper dated 29th December 1900 HICKLING

THE LATE MR GEORGE SIMPSON - In our notice of Mr George Simpson's death, published last week, we omitted to mention that suitable hymns were sung during the funeral service in the Church. The organist, Miss Corner, played the "Dead March" as the procession left the sacred edifice. At the grave, the Wesleyan choir, of which deceased was a member, sang "Would Jesus have the sinner die?" to the tune "Sovereignty", a favourite tune of the deceased. A wreath under a glass shade was placed upon the grave by the members of the choir. Deceased leaves five sons and three daughters.

On March 16th 1901 an auction, to be held at Hickling, was announced of "valuable live and dead farming stock, including four registered shire mares and fillies". The farming stock comprised sixteen cattle, eleven sheep, two pigs and nine horses. The auctioneers advertised that "the dairy cows are excellent milkers and the young animals in good store condition. The Shire Mares and Fillies are specially worthy of attention, being good, sound animals, and by the most noted sires of the day".

## The moment your life changes

I guess when most people think about life changing events it tends to be the more obvious ones such as marriage, divorce, death or the birth of a child. There's no doubt that those events are all significant. However I was thinking the other day about my life now and tried to trace back in my mind to the significant point when this path all started. This led to a startling realisation

Back in June 1983 I had moved up to Salisbury from Devon and was living temporarily in an old friends spare room. One Saturday morning I was wandering aimlessly around town when I happened to pass an estate agents with a sign in the window that read "rooms to let". I'd almost walked past when on the spur of the moment I thought I would have a quick look in as I couldn't stay in my friends spare room forever. The estate agent took me to a single room in a shared house. There was room for a bed and a wardrobe and not much else but it was affordable on my meagre wages at the time so I took it and moved in the following weekend.

I didn't know any of my other four new housemates but they seemed friendly enough and it turned out one of them was the new manager of the Cathedral Hotel just down the road. It wasn't a place I would ever normally have gone into but as she said she could pull us the occasional free pint in the hotel bar that was recommendation enough!

Once I'd become a semi regular at the hotel bar I met a new barmaid who was quite shy at first (even shyer than me!). However I persuaded the manager to ask her if she might fancy going out with me for a drink one night, a cowardly approach but it worked! Thirteen months later we got married.

Two years later we moved up to the midlands, eventually settled into our present jobs, had our two sons and got to where we are today living happily in Hickling. The thing is none of this might have happened if on that morning in June 1983 I hadn't made the split second decision to walk into that estate agents office. It's worth thinking about sometime. Maybe the moment your life changed was as mundane as mine. It's never recognised at the time and its true significance only becomes apparent 25 years later!



**Quantum of Solace -** He's back. Daniel Craig allays any fear that he was just a one-Martini Bond, with this, his second 007 adventure, the perplexingly named Quantum Of Solace. Under the direction of Marc Forster, the movie ladles out the adrenalin in a string of deafening episodes: car chases, plane wrecks and motor boat collisions.

Milk - celebratory portrait of pioneering gay activist Harvey Milk shows him earning his place in history, in 1977, by being elected to the San Francisco board of supervisors, the first openly gay man to hold public office in the US. He is played here by Sean Penn with the kind of ferocious virility and detailed concentration that only Penn can bring to a role.




Nicole Kidman, with her feet firmly on the ground, gazing up with wonder at Hugh Jackman (the Drover), as well she might, in *Australia*.

Australia - Nicole Kidman plays Lady Sarah Ashley, a British aristocrat who flies in September 1939 to Australia, where her errant husband runs a cattle station in the Northern Territory. Meeting her in Darwin to escort her to the farm is "the Drover" (Hugh Jackman), a tough, independent wrangler. Initially hostile to each other, the pair develop a mutual respect and romance inevitably follows. This occurs when Lady Ashley's husband is found dead (murdered by thugs employed by a rival cattle baron) and to save the station's fortunes, she and the Drover must take a herd hundreds of miles to be shipped out of Darwin. Australia has been described as an epic love story, and a quite extraordinary piece of kitsch - everything about the film is wildly over the top.

Gomorrah – a film about the power and reach of the Neapolitan mob: the camorra. The action takes place mostly in and around the tenement buildings of Scampìa in Naples. The mob has been split by a turf war, called a "secession", signalled in the film's first minute by a grisly gang hit on some camorristi in a tanning salon - the resulting war divides loyalties, and creates ruptures and fissions that discharge individual stories like jetsam. Gomorrah is not a mob film in the classical vein, because there is no Scarface or central boss figure with whom we are tacitly allowed to become fascinated. It is very violent and presents a depressing view of southern Italy.
